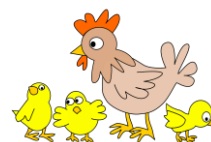
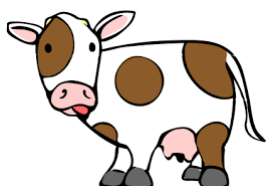

(G) Preserved Fruit, (H) Jams and Jellies, (I) Pickles and Sauces	BETWEEN 9am & 10.30am ON THE SATURDAY BEFORE SHOW DAY but may be delivered prior to this if desired
(K) Cookery – Open, Novice and (J) Junior	BETWEEN 9am & 10.45am ON THE SATURDAY BEFORE SHOW DAY.
(L) Group Exhibit, (M) Hospital, Hostel or Day Care Centre, (N) Arts and Crafts, (O) Junior Arts and Crafts, (P) Junior Needlework, (Q) District Needlework and (R) Open Needlework including VAS Classes	BETWEEN 2pm & 4pm ON THE FRIDAY BEFORE SHOW DAY but may be delivered prior to this
(S) Photography	Secretary's Office at the Henderson Pavilion <u>no later than 4.00 PM on the TUESDAY BEFORE SHOW DAY.</u> (This is so the photos can be sent away for judging)

- Entry fee as stated. JUNIOR classes are FREE entry.
- Entry fees are payable on lodgement of entry form unless otherwise arranged with the Show Secretary..
- If no Exhibitor has been awarded at least two prizes in a Section then no Most Successful Exhibitor prize will be given.
- First Prize will be \$4.00; Second Prize will be \$2.00 unless otherwise stated. Your Prize Card is your Voucher for prize money, which will be available after 4.30 on Show Day.
- Children exhibiting on Show Day MUST be in the Year or Grade referred to in the Class heading.
- Return postage for Exhibits is paid for by the Exhibitor.
- All Exhibits are to be the bona fide work of the Exhibitor. The maker's name must not be visible except for paintings.
- No one article can be entered in two sections.
- Entries must be lodged at the Show Office and the Exhibit ticket supplied must be attached to the Exhibit.
- Novice Sections are limited to persons who have not won a first prize for an Open or Novice Class in that Section at previous Rutherglen Shows.
- Exhibitors may not enter both Novice and Open Classes in the same Section.
- All Exhibits must be clean, produced in the previous 12 months, and must not have been previously exhibited at any Rutherglen Show.
- In all Classes, NO Exhibitor is allowed to remove an exhibit OR part of an exhibit from the exhibition before 4.30pm on Show Day when they must contact the Steward in attendance.

REGULATIONS

1. General entries must be made on the relevant entry form and delivered to the Show Secretary at the Henderson Pavilion, Rutherglen by 12 NOON on FRIDAY 13 OCTOBER, 2017; however earlier entries are encouraged. Each exhibitor will be given a sticker which must be attached to each exhibit to ensure exhibits are placed into their correct Section and Class. Late entries for Flowers may be made up to Friday 20th October by 5 pm.
2. All pavilion exhibits, (except where otherwise specified) must be delivered to the Henderson Pavilion by the time stated in Pavilion Conditions. This regulation will be strictly enforced.
3. All Outside Exhibitors must restrict their activities to the area allotted as per Ground Space Application. Society regulations require that all Ground fees MUST be paid prior to Show Day.
4. Ages of Horses to date from 1st August. (see separate schedule for Horse events)
5. The judges have the power to withhold any prize if they deem the Exhibit unworthy, or give a lesser prize; or they may award Special Prizes in the form of Certificates of Merit, for exhibits which they may deem worthy.
6. All Articles shown must be the Bona Fide property of the exhibitor (except in Flowers for decorative arrangements). All cereals exhibited for the exhibition must be the Bona Fide growth or make of the exhibitor and must be the produce of the last preceding harvest. This rule will be strictly enforced.
7. In cases of a difference of opinion between judges, the services of an independent judge will be used.
8. Pre-paid Members Subscriptions -\$25 includes entry for 2 Adults and four children under 16 to the Show and entrance for their vehicle to the Showgrounds.
9. No person except those considered actually necessary will be allowed to accompany exhibits and/or exhibitors at judging.
10. Non-members will be admitted to the Showgrounds on payment of \$15 per Adult, \$3 for Children 5 to 16, and Children Under 5 years old are free. Family tickets are \$30 for 2 Adults and up to 4 children under 16 years. Car parking for 1 car is \$4.00.
11. Any person being an exhibitor will not be allowed to be present during the adjudication of the Judges (excepting Live Stock and in any section where the Judge deems it necessary) and any exhibitor remaining near the Judge will forfeit all right to a prize in that Section.
12. No person shall be permitted to exhibit in any classes for which he or she is acting as a Steward.
13. The Society will not in any circumstances hold itself responsible for any loss or mis-delivery of any exhibit at the Society's exhibition or any damage thereto.
14. Any person insulting or interfering with the Judges during the Show will be subject to removal from the grounds and the prizes awarded to him/her forfeited. Members of the Society so aggressing will be liable to expulsion.
15. No appeal, against the decision of the Judges will be entertained unless the same is made in writing and lodged with the Show Secretary before 6 o'clock on the day of the Show and a deposit of \$10 lodged, which will be forfeited if the Committee considers the appeal to be frivolous.
16. In the event of any protest being received it will be considered by the Committee at the next meeting after the Show and its decision shall be final.

17. No exhibit shall be allowed to be removed before 4.30pm on Show Day and will, in every respect, be considered the property of the Society until that time.
18. Only Prize cards won at this Show will be allowed to be placed on exhibits. Your prize card is your pay voucher. Children under 16 years of age must be accompanied by a parent or guardian. All prize money must be checked before exhibitor leaves the showground as no appeal will be considered after Show Day.
19. All individual Exhibitors must provide a completed and signed Entry form ONE PERSON ONLY per entry form.
20. Any infringement of these rules will disqualify exhibitors from taking prizes awarded to them.
21. This Society is affiliated with the North Eastern Agricultural Societies Association and V.A.S Ltd. It has been determined by these bodies that in the event of any exhibitor being offensive to any Judge, their entry will be declined by all Societies affiliated with the Association and any prize money won by them shall be withheld. Other penalties imposed by any Society in the association will be upheld and endorsed by all affiliated members.
22. Owners entering livestock do so entirely at their own risk and it is a condition of entry in any event that no liability of any kind attaches to the Society, the Committee, Officials and Members in any respect whatsoever. The Society will not be responsible for any accident that may be caused through or by any exhibit and it shall be a condition of entry that each exhibitor shall hold the Society harmless and indemnify it against any legal proceedings arising from such an accident.
23. In Classes where there are prizes and trophies for "Most Successful Exhibitor" points will be allotted as follows; First – 4 points, Second – 2 points, Third or Highly Commended- 1 point In the event of a tie, the count back is to apply. Exhibitors must have received at least 2 prizes in a Section to be eligible for Most Successful Exhibitor for that Section.

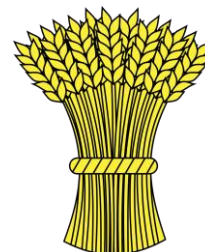

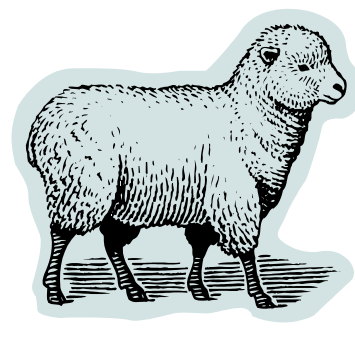

CONDITIONS OF ENTRY

ENTRY FEE - \$10

- NLIS – all sheep are required to have a PIC tag attached when attending the Show.
- Exhibitors are restricted to three entries per class
- No shorn lambs will be accepted.
- Classes must be of this seasons lambing, not shorn, to be bred by the exhibitor from commercial flock ewes, lambs sex and breed to be declared. Entries must be penned by 10am for judging. The Rutherglen Agricultural society Inc. reserves the right to reject any entry considered not to conform to the above conditions.
- Judging commences 10am. (Chief Steward to make final decision). Lambs should be selected for evenness and ability to dress out within the desired ranges.
- Lambs over 50kg will not be accepted.
- For the awarding of champion points, exhibitors with multiple entries in each class will be allocated champion points on a basis that maximises champion points, that is the highest placed entry in Hoof Section from Class 1 will be paired with their highest ranked entry from Class 2.



SECTION 2B - STUD SHEEP DISPLAY

FREE ENTRY

- Exhibitors are limited to a maximum of 10 sheep per exhibit.
- NLIS – all sheep are required to have a PIC tag attached when attending the Show.
- Exhibitors may also enter lambs in the Hoof competition if desired.

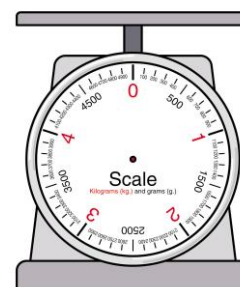

- To facilitate the displaying of fleece for Judging, it is recommended that a sheet of paper be placed in the fleece when rolling.
- Fleeces to be judged on the following points system:

Trueness to Breed	10 points
Soundness	10 points
Evenness	10 points
Conformity of Length	10 points
Handle	8 points
Colour or Bloom	8 points
Clean Fleece Weight	30 points
Character	8 points
Density	6 points
TOTAL	100 Points

Fleeces to be not more than 12 months growth and to be shorn from sheep are the property of the Exhibitor for at least 6 months prior to the Show. Fleeces to be skirted by Exhibitors and only skirted fleeces to be shown.

TUG OF WAR RULES

THE ROPE

The game involves a single rope with a red mark made in the middle of the rope. This red mark is placed at a perpendicular angle to align to the exact centre point marked on the ground before the commencement of the game. A coloured mark is made on each end of the rope exactly 13 feet (4 metres) from the red mark. This is the point where the first member of each team will stand.

The objective of the game is for each team to pull the rope along with the members of the opposition team to their side.

TEAMS

Whilst the rules of the game allow a maximum of 8 members to a team, the Show Committee has nominated a maximum of 4 members for each team, with no combined weight limitations.

HOW TO PLAY

The centre of the rope (red mark) should align with the centre point marked on the ground.

There are 3 different commands the Judge gives the players.

- Pick up the Rope
- Take the String
- Pull

As soon as the Judge commands "Pull" each team can start pulling the rope into their territory.

If a member of a team falls down that member is given a caution. Each team is allowed two cautions before being disqualified.

Fouls resulting in Disqualification.

- Lowering your elbow below the knee level while pulling the rope is a foul called "locking".
- Touching the ground for a prolonged period of time is considered a foul.

The game is won when either side's coloured mark crosses the centre point.

Judge's decision is final.

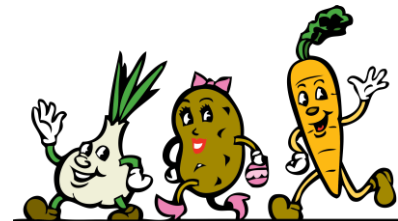

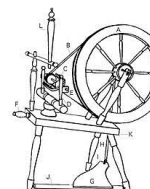

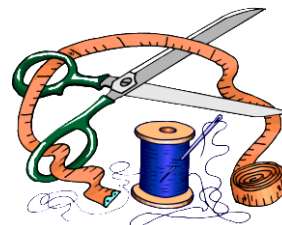

Summary

VAS Ltd promotes and coordinates two award programs that encourage and support young people living in rural and regional Victoria, the Victorian Agricultural Shows Rural Ambassador and the VAS Ltd. Junior Show Ambassador Award.

The Awards highlight and celebrate rural and regional young people, with a particular emphasis on candidates who are involved with their local show. The Awards seek to draw attention to the talent, creativity and ingenuity of young rural Victorians and in doing so encourage the candidates to become engaged citizens across local communities.

During the Awards cycle the candidates participate in public relations and leadership seminars to enable them to polish their communication and presentation skills and prepare them for the State Finals. Both the Victorian Agricultural Shows Rural Ambassador Awards and the Junior Show Ambassador start at the local show or field day level and progress to a Group final where the winner is invited to compete at the State Final of each Award.

It is not a requirement of either Award that the local show or field day hold a competition to determine a winner at the show/field day; how the winner is determined is entirely up to the show/field day.

Aims of the Rural Ambassador Awards

To highlight the talent, creativity and ingenuity of young rural people and in doing so, encourage entrants to be role models in their local communities.

To assist all entrants through their participation to develop strong leadership and communication qualities.

To enable entrants to gain greater proficiency in their chosen field and also develop entrants' stature and reputation in that chosen field.

Entrants must be aged over 20 years and under 30 years as at 1 May (2018).

FRUIT CAKE COMPETITION

If you mention country shows to anyone all over Australia the conversation will inevitably turn to fruit cakes, who has the best recipe, how big the cake should be, how long to soak the dried fruit, whether to use sherry or brandy, (or better, both) and which tin to use, how much shrinkage is allowable in the cooked cake, the list goes on.

In fact, baking fruit cakes is more than a time honoured tradition; fruit cake is the number one VAS competition as far as sheer numbers of exhibits go.
That's a whole lot of cake.

Rules and Regulations

1. The fruit cake competitions follows the show-group-state level of competition
2. An exhibitor having won at a Show, will bake another cake for entry in the Group Final; the winner will then be required to bake a further cake for the State Final
3. Exhibitors are to follow the recipe and specifications (listed over)
4. An exhibitor having won at show/field day level is not eligible to enter any other show/field day until after the Group judging, when, if not the winning entry, can compete further
5. An exhibitor is only eligible to represent one Group in the State Final
6. Each cake entered must be the bona fide work of the exhibitor
7. If for any reason a winner is unable to compete at Group or State Final level then the second placegetter is eligible to compete

State Final Prizes

First - \$200 plus Trophy; Second - \$100; Third - \$50.

Hot Tips for exhibitors

- A well-kept competition cake-making secret: Lay a tea towel over the cake rack before turning the cake out to prevent the imprint of the cake rack appearing on your competition cake.
- To ensure uniformity and depending upon the size, it is suggested the raisins be snipped into 2 or 3 pieces, cherries into 4 or 6 pieces and almonds crosswise into 3 or 4 pieces

SECTION K - Class 55 VAS Rich Fruit Cake Recipe

ENTRY FEE \$1.50

Open to fruit cake enthusiasts everywhere

Ingredients

250g sultanas
250g chopped raisins
250g currants
125g chopped mixed peel
90g chopped red glace cherries
90g chopped blanched almonds
1/3 cup sherry or brandy
250g plain flour
60g self-raising flour
1/4 teaspoon grated nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
250g butter
250g soft brown sugar
1/2 teaspoon lemon essence OR finely grated lemon rind
1/2 teaspoon almond essence
1/2 teaspoon vanilla essence
4 large eggs



Method

1. Mix together all the fruits and nuts and sprinkle with the sherry or brandy. Cover and leave for at least 1 hour, but preferably overnight
2. Sift together the flours and spices. Cream together the butter and sugar with the essences. Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition, and then alternately add the fruit and flour mixtures. Mix thoroughly. The mixture should be stiff enough to support a wooden spoon.
3. Place the mixture into a prepared tin **20 cm square, straight sided, square cornered tin** and bake in a slow oven for approximately 3½ - 4 hours.
4. Allow the cake to cool in the tin

SECTION J - Class 45. VAS Junior Boiled Fruit Cake Recipe

FREE ENTRY

A competition for junior cake bakers aged under 18 on the day of their local show/ field day

Ingredients

375g Mixed Fruit
¾ cup brown sugar
1 teaspoon mixed spice
½ cup water
125g butter
½ teaspoon bicarbonate soda
½ cup sherry
2 eggs, lightly beaten
2 tablespoons marmalade
1 cup self-raising flour
1 cup plain flour
¼ teaspoon salt



Method

1. Place the mixed fruit, sugar, spice, water and butter in a large saucepan and bring to the boil
2. Simmer gently for 3 minutes, then remove from stove, add bicarbonate soda and allow to cool
3. Add the sherry, eggs and marmalade, mixing well
4. Fold in the sifted dry ingredients then place in a greased and lined 20cm round cake tin
5. Bake in a moderately slow oven for 1.5 hours or until cooked when tested

- 1 tablespoon orange marmalade
- 1 cup canola oil
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- ¾ cup orange juice
- 1 cup reduced fat milk

Method

1. Pre heat oven to 190C (moderately hot)
 2. Line a 12 hole muffin pan with Round Paper Muffin Cases (**Classic White Muffin Cases Size 35mm height x 90mm wide x 50mm base**)
 3. Sift dry ingredients into a large bowl; stir in dates, carrots. Then add the combined marmalade, oil, eggs, juice and milk. Mix until just combined
 4. Spoon mixture evenly into Muffin paper cases in muffin pan.
 5. Cook for 20 minutes. To test if muffins are cooked insert cake skewer; if it comes out clean the muffins are ready
 6. Stand muffins in pan for 5 minutes before removing to cool.

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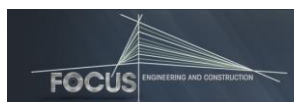
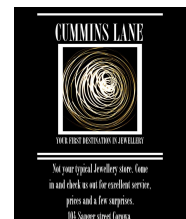
